

UCLG ASPAC ORGANISATION

CONSISTS OF FIVE PRINCIPAL ORGANS AS FOLLOW:

1. THE REGIONAL GENERAL ASSEMBLY

The supreme organ of the Section; Responsible for the overall policy, direction, and oversight of the Section; Comprises all members of UCLG ASPAC, through their duty appointed representatives; Convened every two years normally at the time of the Regional Congress to which both the Section members and non-members are invited.

2. THE REGIONAL COUNCIL

The principal policy-making body of the Section; Decides the Section's policies in a collegial way; Ensures general policies decided by the Regional General Assembly are implemented; Meet at least once a year, as convened by the President or at the request of at least one third of its members.

3. THE EXECUTIVE BUREAU

Responsible for initiating proposals and carrying out decisions of the Regional Council and for any other matter delegated to it by the Regional Council; In charge of the Section's administrative and financial management; Prepares the meetings of the Regional Council and of the Regional General Assembly; Meet at least twice a year, as convened by the President or at the request of at least one third of its members.


4. THE PRESIDENCY

Comprises the President and eight Co-Presidents; Elected by Regional Council from among local government members representing different sub-regions, for a renewable term between two ordinary sessions of the Regional General Assembly; Represents the four sub-regions as well as associate and international members and includes the Co-President (from the host city of the Secretariat) and the Founding President. To ensure the women representation in the Presidency, the Chair of the Women in Local Governments Standing Committee becomes the Co-president.

5. THE SECRETARY GENERAL

The chief executive officer of the Section; Directs the daily activities of the Section and carries out the decisions of the Regional General Assembly, the Regional Council and the Executive Bureau; Manages the General Secretariat and the activities, programmes and finances of the Section under the guidance of the Presidency and reporting to the Executive Bureau.

PROCESS Involved local community from consultation process, construction works, and putting final touches by painting or cleaning.
CURRENT USE Venue for dancing practice and cultural performances, preferred place to hold local game competition for celebrating national independence day, religious donation activity to feed the needy.



SRIWEDARI HUMAN PUPPET CULTURE HALL SRIWEDARI PARK

IDEA Ensured cultural elements materialised in culture hall development.
PROCESS Collaborative Planning method, involving public figures, architects, Sriwedari artists, Public Works and Spatial Planning Agency, Culture and Tourism Agency of Surakarta local government.
RESULT Culture Hall Revitalisation involved cultural elements incorporated in the physical design of the culture hall and improvement covers development of dynamic stage space, good acoustic arrangement, and player support facilities.



CREATIVE PUBLIC SPACE KEPUTIH

IDEA Ensured local community voices scaled up and their needs met in the public space developed from abandoned old building.
PROCESS Invited community representatives (disabilities, community of art, sport, education, organisations with concerns in women and children) from early design process.
RESULT Design accommodated community needs: gallery, elevated pathway (for people with disabilities), sports field, community space, prayer room, children playground, pool, and movie area.



TANAH KALI KEDINDING

IDEA Ensured youth involvement in designing public space by using Minecraft.
PROCESS Invited youth and local community in the Minecraft workshop and design development.
RESULT Design accommodated youth and community needs: playground, toilets, sufficient lighting, parking, jogging track, pool, and volley field.




• BENEFIT LOCAL GOVERNMENT


We assisted local government of Jambi and Malang to manage their municipal solid waste and transform it into organic compost, biogas, and recyclables cost effective through the development of decentralised Integrated Resource Recovery Centre (IRRC).

The implementation of IRRC is built on partnerships with local and national stakeholders: local communities, civil society organisations, national government entities. The integral involvement of local communities helps to positively shape community behaviour towards waste minimisation and recycling.

HOW WE DO IT

SCORE CARD

- Encourage continuous usage of both detail and pre-liminary scorecard versions to improve city resilient level towards disaster.
- In collaboration with partner, conduct training and workshop to introduce and familiarise the usage of the score-card among local governments of multiple level.



QUICK RISK ESTIMATION (QRE) TOOL

- Stimulate city to formulate action plan after disaster identification by using the QRE tool.
- Assist local governments in utilising the tool through various trainings and workshops.
- Conduct follow up by providing continuous assistance and ensure local governments have comprehensive understanding through the completion of data submission.

ESTABLISHMENT OF POLICY ADVOCACY UNIT

WHAT

- a) An independent body that consists of representatives of local governments, national government, international non-governmental organisations, and civil society organisations with like-minded vision.
- b) The body will closely review smart practices of sanitation in the country and determine the best and most appropriate one to formulate a national level policy.

GOAL

- a) Unite and scale up voices of municipalities to government at national level.
- b) Raise awareness of municipalities on national level policy on sanitation.
- c) Ensure the implementation of national level policy by all municipalities.



ESTABLISHMENT OF KNOWLEDGE CENTRE

GOAL

Create the learning environment to accelerate the replication of smart practices and push forward the implementation of better sanitation system in the municipalities.



LOCAL GOVERNMENT STRENGTHENING

HOW

- a) Build local governments' capacity to contribute to the implementation of national level "Institutional Regulatory Framework" on sanitation.
- b) Provide technical training on faecal sludge management and sanitation and ToT on Sanitation Policy Framework.
- c) Enhance the capacity of local governments to expand their network and partnership with larger stakeholders (private sectors, international organisations).


